

St Joseph's RC Primary School Anti-bullying Policy

Dundee City Council Statement:

"Dundee City Council is committed to providing a safe, supportive environment for all people in its educational establishments."

 At St Joseph's RC Primary School, we have a commitment to our Catholic faith, we promote a caring, welcoming and happy environment, fostering the development and co-operation of all children

Policy Aims

This policy will outline how we aim to prevent bullying and how we will address any bullying issue which occurs.

The aims of this policy:

- to define bullying
- to prevent bullying of children and young people
- to outline strategies used in our school to prevent bullying and to ensure a co-ordinated and cohesive approach
- to outline a variety of possible responses to bullying incidents
- to ensure everyone knows how to report bullying
- to ensure everyone understands we will not tolerate bullying at St Joseph's
- to highlight how we aim to equip our pupils and families with the skills to enable them to deal with bullying behaviour
- to detail our practices which will proactively prevent bullying at St Joseph's

Definition of Bullying

"Bullying can be regarded as a mixture of behaviours and impacts which can influence a person's capacity to feel in control of themselves. It can be repetitive, or isolated, intentional or unintentional behaviours that hurts, intimidates or embarrasses a person."

One person's perception of bullying can vary differently to another person's.

The views of staff and pupils at St Joseph's are noted below; Bullying can be;

being called names

- being made fun of
- being hit, pushed about or physically hurt
- being ignored/feeling isolated
- sending/spreading messages/images via internet/social media
- spreading rumours
- being forced to hand over money or possessions

Bullying can be emotional, physical and/or cyber (this includes the use of Internet, social media and other electronic devices).

The reasons for bullying behaviour could be prejudiced based, eg;

- race
- gender
- disability
- nationality
- sexual orientation
- socio-economic status
- nationality
- language
- religion
- the perception of 'being different'

It is often difficult to understand why someone choses to bully another. Bullying has been known to occur because the person exhibiting bullying behaviour;

- is upset or angry
- is jealous
- feels they don't fit in or are being excluded
- has problems at home/out-with school
- is being bullied themselves (including adults and family members)
- wants to appear powerful
- is scared of being bullied themselves

Expectations

At St Joseph's;

- we expect all members of the school community (children and adults) to behave in a mutually respective manner and treat others the way they expect to be treated.
- all members of our school community have the duty to report bullying behaviour
- we view bullying as unacceptable
- situations are reported and investigated quickly.
- anyone affected by bullying behaviour is supported in the appropriate ways
- measures are put in place to support the person who is displaying the bullying behaviour

In the school, children can;

- support other children in relationships
- be considerate and understanding

- be aware of feelings of others
- report any perceived incidences of bullying behaviour

Through Curriculum for Excellence, staff will;

- Guide children through Health and Wellbeing outcomes
- Focus on respect, equality, resilience and UNCRC at assemblies
- Guide children through the Roman Catholic Religious Education outcomes, focussing in particular on Gospel Values, empathy, patience and understanding
- Involve everyone in PSD activities

As part of our whole school approach, staff will;

- Foster positive relationships
- celebrate diversity through everything we do
- Provide and support friendship and social skills groups where required
- Uphold our positive and inclusive ethos, where our diversity is celebrated
- Uphold our positive relationships strategy
- Ensure the anti-bullying co-ordinator is known to everyone

In the playground staff will;

- give pupils support in making new friends
- provide play opportunities for all children
- provide supervision
- listen to children when they report incidences of bullying and take appropriate action
- help identify children who may require support

Parents/Carers can;

- be positive role models
- communicate with school staff
- report concerns about children
- encourage good relationships with all children
- promote tolerance of diversity and difference

School Leadership team/Anti bullying Coordinator will;

- appoint a member of school staff who will investigate and work through the concern
- communicate effectively with all involved
- ensure that reporting procedures are carried out

Detection of Bullying

Bullying behaviour usually takes place out of sight of adults. The following can be indicators of Bullying;

- increased absence
- individuals appearing isolated from peers
- pupils asking to stay in at breaks
- regular loss of money or personal items
- pupils appearing frightened, withdrawn, upset, unduly worried, unable to focus on work

Action if Bullying Behaviour is Reported or Detected

Each incidence of bullying may require a different response.

At St Joseph's, we have a wealth of resources and strategies available including;

- Open Door Policy for ainvolving parents/carers
- mediation by the Anti-Bullying Co-ordinator or another adult
- peer mediation
- consequence issued to those that displayed bullying behaviour
- removal of those concerned from class/playground
- Support / 1:1 check ins from our School and Family Development Workers
- reporting incidents to the Head Teacher
- consider referral to other agencies such as DEPS, SPACE, CAMHS, KIKO
- completing of Bullying Report Form on SEEMIS
- involving the Community Police Officer

In all cases we will

- investigate the incident fully
- monitor the situation and where appropriate provide continuing support to those affected
- inform parents/carers of those involved

Advice for Parents/Carers
